A Farewell from LeNora Duerksen, Chaplain & SSD from 10/2/2007-11/12/2021

After retiring from my career with the United States Postal Service, I received my Masters of Divinity at Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary in Elkhart, Indiana. I walked into the SMRC Chapel for the first time on Labor Day weekend in 2007 to help officiate at Rose Wedel's memorial service; she was a member of the church I was serving. I felt very welcomed and was surprised when first Eric Beye, whom I had known and worked with since 1982 at Barnstormers and the Old Mill Restaurant, and then Keith Pankratz, handed me a job application directly after the service.

It has been my pleasure, privilege, and honor to serve God for over 14 years in the mission faithfully portrayed by resident-centered care at Sunshine Meadows. My priority position as Chaplain has always been part time, so I have also

served in other capacities. I've worked at various positions, such as Activities Director for independent living residents, and front desk receptionist. These various positions were held until the Social Services Designee position became available in June, 2011. A few of the eclectic things that I have enjoyed doing at SMRC include: Helping to decorate the lobby and showcase for each changing season; helping pot flowers; decorating the venue for the annual Gala; having a weekly Bible study in each neighborhood; providing daily devotions/prayers before meals in AL/nursing; being able to hold hands with the senior saints on the sometimes arduous journey to the pearly gates; facilitating Parkinson Disease Support Group, including the greater community of caregivers; assisting with graduation parties (Celebration of Life services) held in the chapel for over 500 dear souls; being a part of the fun cast for the fundraiser held at the Old Mill and all the hilarity of making authentic animal voices; the close bond with the residents and colleagues strengthened within the context of suffering/rejoicing together through all the ups and downs in the activities of daily living; hosting 17 group events for residents/employees and/or fundraising events at our Longhorn Ranch (behind Goessel, as they say), and hosting the SMRC employee picnic, held at our place during the reign of Doris Coats Gray as DON.

Some of my favorite memories include the glory days spent with the independent living residents doing activities, including their annual trek for brunch at our house; the days spent with nursing residents, visiting, fishing, feeding day old bread to the cows and horse, riding four-wheelers in the pasture and enjoying a shady picnic lunch packed by Eric's team; enabling visitation evenings and weekends between residents and family during the COVID shut down; the hard work of hosting fundraising events, knowing it was all worth it for the deepened friendship, laughter, and resources raised for SMRC. I shall always treasure the memory of the teamwork generated during the pandemic due to shortages in dietary, nursing, etc., that afforded us the opportunity to NEVER say "That's not my job" as we stepped up to fill the needs of our residents. I have always considered Chaplaincy the greatest privilege ever, as we held hands on our sojourn through the final chapter of life with senior saints. The cost of this intimate connection requires time, energy, resources, and most important of all, vulnerability and an aversion to superficiality.

I hope to continue listening for the call to serve the marginalized in some capacity that the Good Lord reveals to me in His perfect timing. Slowing down the pace; allowing the first streaks of sunshine to be the gracious replacement of my alarm clock; perhaps an annual escape from Kansas blizzards to a tropical beach; more moments for reading the Word and other stories to myself and to my beloved grandchildren and adults; more time to enjoy God's great creation outdoors, whether in national parks or my own "Garden of Weed'n"; perhaps even visiting the longhorn ranches of cherished friends; being more available for my mother and my husband and family... in other words, just being present in the present!

As I look forward to this transition, I have no huge bucket list other than getting my berm greenhouse built and sewing room organized. I cherish BEING -- more available to help others, whether that is clearing trees out of pastures, visiting Logan and family in Alaska, Lucius and family in the El Dorado countryside, or playing and working with Lyndl and family residing in the Duerksen Hills; and simply greeting the dawn, sipping hot latte on my deck while geese honk on the pond, in unhurried quiet time, praising my Lord and Savior. To borrow the words of Paul in his letter to the church at Philippi: "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything be excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me, put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you!" (Phil. 4:8-9)


Soon, the two ladies were bundled up in blankets and transported to the huge Montana boarding house. Both of them were able to smile as they faced the future.









Vaccines — lessons from three centuries of protest - Nature

What are the possible side effects of a COVID-19 vaccine? The most common symptoms are fatigue, headache, muscle pain, chills, and injection site pain. More people experience these side effects after the second dose. You may have side effects after vaccination, but this is your body's expected reaction, and it means the vaccine is working. Vaccines rarely cause long-term side effects. How effective are the COVID-19 vaccines? The three authorized vaccines have greater than 90% effectiveness in clinical trials against hospitalization and death from the virus. Why not wait until more people get the vaccine? Widespread vaccination is critical to help stop the pandemic and reach herd immunity. Less than 40% of Kansans ages 18+ are fully vaccinated. 325+ million people are fully vaccinated worldwide. Do I need to vaccinate if I already had COVID-19? Reinfection is possible, so vaccination is recommended even if a person has previously been infected with SARS-CoV-2 – the virus that causes COVID-19. People over the age of 65 have less than 50% protection against reinfection with SARS-CoV-2. Younger people have less than 80% protection against reinfection with SARS-CoV-2 – but could spread it to others.

CONFIDENTIALITY OF PERSONAL & CLINICAL RECORDS: Your medical, social and financial records will be released only to those staff who need them, to other health care institutions if you require care by those facilities or when required by law or by the agency that is paying for your care.

You have the right to inspect and purchase photocopies of your records upon written request and two business days' notice to the facility. You will be charged the prevailing community rate for photocopying the records you request.
